occurred a configuration in this statutate wrought so much destitution as fire on Lake and St. Croix avenues this city last Sanday. Investigation y terday showed that the estimates in TNews Tribune of \$100,000 damage and as the News Tribune of \$100,000 damage and of 1,000 to 1,000 people having been renders homeless or fairly destitute were not exaggerated. As a matter of fact, the fit was an appating calamity for a larg number of people, and scores of familie are destitute.

Some of these families took refuge with large

number of people, and scores of families are destitute. Some of these families took refuge with neighbors or friends in various parts of the city. It is sald that many families are taking care of fire sufferers whose own resources are very slender. The list of destitute is already a long one, and it will grow today. So many of the people that were burned out have gone to live temporarily with friends or relatives that it is impossible to get a complete list of losses or of the wholly destitute.

The burned district continued to be an object of interest all yesterday. The acres of smouthering ruins were looked on with sadness by many that had lost the savings of years.

There is said to be great need for clothing of all kinds for men, women and children. The Bethel was headquarters for distributing much of the relief yesterday. The work is done under the direction of Superintendent Robel, and he says that he could use \$50 to excellent advantage if he had it. He wants contributions of clothing, furniture and provisions, in addition to any money subscriptions.
