

## MATTERS MATRIMONIAL.

The Nuptials of Miss Minnie Clayburgh and Mr. Benjamin H. Mayer—Marriage Ceremony of Miss Martha Johnson and Mr. Alonso C. Mather.

### CLAYBURGH-MAYER.

A magnificent wedding, and one of considerable importance in the Jewish society of this city, occurred at Standard Hall yesterday afternoon. The occasion was the celebration of the nuptials of Miss Minnie Clayburgh, daughter of Mr. M. Clayburgh, of the well-known firm of Clayburgh, Einstein & Co., and Mr. Benjamin H. Mayer, a prominent New Yorker. About 5 o'clock the bridal party entered the parlors in the following order: Masters Albert, Maurice, and Harry Clayburgh, all brothers of the bride; Miss Nettie Mayer, of Hartford, sister of the groom, and Master Josie Clayburgh, brother of the bride; Miss Annie Mayer and Mr. Simon Mayer, sister and brother of the groom; Miss Ida Clayburgh, sister of the bride, and Mr. Bath Mayer, of New York; Mr. and Mrs. D. Mayer, of Hartford, Conn., parents of the groom; Mrs. M. Clayburgh, the mother of the bride, leaning on the arm of the groom, followed by the beautiful bride, supported by her father. The party arranging themselves in a tasteful manner, the couple were then made man and wife in accordance with the manner of the Rev. Dr. Adler, of the K. A. M. congregation. The ceremony was witnessed by the relatives and intimate acquaintances of the family, and after a short reception, the bridal party led the way to the supper-room. Here was found a sumptuous spread of substantials, and the delicacies of the season. The tables were beautifully decorated with flowers, and crowded with ornamental dishes, the product of the epicurian art. The presents were necessarily numerous and characteristically elegant and costly.

The reception commenced at 8 o'clock, and after the bride had received the many congratulations of her friends, the assemblage retired to the hall above, and here ensued a gay scene of wedding merriment and happiness.
