

A distinctive feature is ncted in the 2,000,000 feet of logs lying in the waters of Lake Vermilion waiting to be sawed. Great pockets extend out in the lake, each much wider at the outer end. As the lows are floated in they are assorted as to length from 18 feet to 50 feet being boomed in their respective pockets. This greatly facilitates the sawing of special orders for certain lengths.


