WASHINGTON, April 13.—The conference report on the bill opening the Sioux reservation passed the house after objection and adjournment, in which Peel, of Arkansas, ably urged action. Col. King was present in the gallery, and when the bill passed the house he almost fainted for joy. His excitement was noticed and commented upon by all in the vicinity. He ran out into the gallery and gave a war whoop for excess of joy. The passage of the bill in the house practically ends the long intense anxiety on the great question. Senator Platt, interviewed, said: "The bill creating the state of South Dakota will pass the senate. Chandler's amendment, which shuts out Senator Edgarton, excites angry opposition for Davis, of Minnesota, but Davis will vote for the bill, even with that argument rather than not let the the other hand, pass. On Chandler says that if his amendment is rejected, he will vote for the bill rather than defeat it. Hence I believe the bill will pass as soon as the vote is reached, wili be Monday or Tuesday.' Delegate Toole and ex-Delegate Magin-nis are both jubilant over the passage of the Montana reservation bill. Maginnis says: "This is the best legislation Montana has had in ten years. It opens the vast territory on the Canadian line, which will soon be settled by energetic, thrifty Americans. The time has come when these pioneers will care for the Northern boundary of the republic. This bill adds wealth and prosperity to Montana and hastens her statehood, which will give two Democratic senators to offset Dakota's Republicans. Hence there is something politic in it as well as financial considerations for the benefit of the commonwealth of Montana's prosperity."

APPROPRIATION BILL.

Springer said to-day: "The omnibus bill will pass the house and will also pass the senate. The bill has been abused by the Democrats as well as Ite-publicans in the Northwest. They do not understand it. This bill has resulted from seventeen years' careful study of Dakota and a careful interest in her advancement, as well as similar interests.

The Legislative, Judicial and Executive Bill Smaller Than the WASHINGTON, April 18.—The legislative, judicial and executive appropriacommittee, makes a total appropriation of \$20,472,394, which is \$937,606 less than the estimates, and \$209,246 less than the current appropriations for the same service. The whole number of salaries provided for is 0,565, being 412 less than the number estimated for and fifty-five the number estimated for and fifty-five more than the number provided for at present. There is, however, an actual increase of only seventeen employes beyond the number of employes now in service. The bill authorizes the readjustment of standard weights and measures furnished to states and territories. A clerk to the speaker is provided for at \$1.600 per annum. The salary of the vice president of the United States at \$8,000 per annum, omitted from the current law because of a vacancy in that office, is annum, omitted from the current law because of a vacancy in that office, is provided for. Two additional clerks are given in the assistant treasurer's office at Chicago at \$1,500 and \$1,200 respectively. The salary of the assistant treasurer at New Orleans is increased \$500 a d an additional clerk allowed, at \$300 a d an additional cierk at \$1,000 given to the assistant treasurer at St. Louis. The force employed at the Carson mint is reduced by five employes. The salaries of the bookeeper, abstract, weight and warrant cierk at the San English and warrant cierk at the San weight and warrant cierk at the San Francisco mint are reduced from \$2,250 to \$2,000 each and no provision is made for operating the St. Louis assay office. The signal office force is rearranged as desired by the chief signal officer, and provision made for thirty-nine em-
