Sudden Death of Mrs. Carrie Thompson in Georgia. The sudden death of Mrs. Carrie

Thompson, widow of the late Horace Thompson, at her winter home in Thomasville, Ga., will bring sadness to many hearts in this city. Mrs. Thompson, the daughter of the late Hon. James J. Scarborough, a prominent citizen of Georgia, was born in Thomasville, Aug. 11, 1882. She removed to this city with her late husband in 1860. With her husband, she filled a prominent place in all religious, philanthropic and charitable work in St. Paul. Since his death, in 1880, she has, with unabated interest and devotion, sought to carry on the work in which they both were interested. For eighteen years she was president of the St. Paul Protestant Orphan asylum. With her husband she united with the First Baptist church of this city early in 1861, having previously been identified with a church of the same denomination in Georgia. son, the daughter of the late Hon. James previously been identified with a church of the same denomination in Georgia. The beautiful edifice of the First Baptist church of St. Paul is an endearing monument to their memory. Mrs. Thompson was for many years president of the ladies' society of the church, and to the last was interested in every detail of the church life and work. She was eminently a devout woman, and gave not only her means, but her sympathy and personal effort as well. Mrs. Thompson, with her sous, started for their winter home Nov. 14. It is supposed that the disease of which she died, pneumonia, was contracted while in New York city en route for Georgia. On Sunday. Reports continued unfavorable until Friday last, when the dispatches were more encouraging.
