Latest Reports of Disaster.

ONLY FIVE WERE KILLED

San Francisco and Oakland Severely Shaken.

People Rush from Their Homes is Terror-Buildings Racked and a Panic Ensues-The Shock Felt at a Distance of Sixty Miles.

87 Telegraph to THE ENTERPRISE.

OAKLAND, July 9.—[By the Associated Press.]—The most terrible explosion that eyer occurred in this neighborhood took place this morning at the giant powder works, just west of Berkeley. It is said that no one was left alive to tell the story. The explosion first began at 9:25 o'clock, when there were two sharp shocks that were felt with terrible distinct ness in Oakland. The next three explosions occurred about three minutes later, were even more sharp than the first re

glycerine house, and blew the building out of the ground. Fire spread, and one by one the magazines began to explode. There were five distinct explosions, and several

small ones from small stores of powder. San Francisco, July 9.—Later dispatche from the scene of the explosion show tha early reports were greatly exagerated so early reports were greatly exagerated so far as loss of life is concerned. Consider-ing the terrific force of the explosion the loss of life is very small, and is believed to be confined to the three white men, John Bowie, Wallace Dickerson and Charles Some Chinamen may be killed t known positively. Early this Company went to the scene soon after the occurred. As they regarded the explosions occurred. As they regarded the wreck of every structure they expressed gratification at the small loss of life. They

gratification at the small loss of life. They say it is almost impossible to estimate the loss but that two hundred thousand dollars will probably be the outside estimate of the damage to the powder works.

The San Francisco Chemical works, owned by Egbert Judson and J. L. N. Shepberd, were almost completely destroyed, and the loss is not far from \$150.000.

At Upson Hill, one hundred yards from the nitro-glycerine which expredded this morning, there were forty-two whites employed; and beyond, around the winding road that leads to the magazines and board-

a vist hole about 500 feet across remains to mark the spot.

The concussion of the explosion of this magazine criphoded the block powder magazine 300 yards east. Between them were the nacking houses where the Chinese were employed. They had fled at the first alarm. Fully 200,000 pounds were stored in the block powder magazine which was built like the other magazine, half under ground. East of it, separating it from the sulphur acid storage tanks and acid works and boarding houses beyonnd was a high embankment thrown up for the special purpose of protection. The explosion of the block powder magazine was terrible. It shatiered everything on the peninsula which the previous explosion had left. It was the force of this expli sion which was most felt in San Francisco. Windows were broken and chimneys toppled over all over Berkeley, as well as in San Francisco and Oakland.

Five bodies, three being those of white

Five bodies, three being those of white men employed at the works and two Chinese, have been taken to the Oakland morgue, and the belief now prevails that these number all those killed at the time of the explosion. The number injured has not been definitely ascertained. It is believed the damage in this city from the breakage of glass windows will reach \$10,000.

There is great damage in West Berkeley. Not a window is left in place, and several buildings are wrecked.

## Strikers Shot.

BAKERSFIELD, Cal., July 9 .- (By the As sociated Press. |- Two trainmen. Ed Ben son and Geo. Rogers, said to be the leader of the strikers of the Southern Pacific train men, were shot this morning just as a pas senger train was leaving the yard for Sa Francisco, by senger train was leaving the yard for San Francisco, by a mon-union man named Ackley, who goes by the name of Judge 'ckley. It appears Ackley did not go out with the strikers, and they have threatened vengeance on him ever since. Ackley came to Baker-field last night as a brakeman, and was leaving this morning when Benson and Rogers juniped aboard and got into an altercation with Ackley. Ackley shot Rogers in the body and Benson through both arms. It is thought Rogers' wounds are fatal. Ackley jumped from the train and took to the bush on Kern river, and has not yet been found, although all the strikers, constables and a number of deputy sheriffs are hunting him.

Leaders deny the truth of the report that cannons are being shipped to them from Texas. They also deny that their men have entered the mill property recently, or that they are fortifying against attack.

Men have made arrangements with the labor leaders in this and other States to keep a watch on the Pinkerton novements and promphy notify leaders here.

In Illinois the Federation of Labor have men prepared to have Pinkertons arrested and put under bonds to keep the peace if any attempt is made to leave the State. Knights of Labor are also scrively working in behalf of the Amalgamated Association, and an endeavor will be made to form a complete atlance with all organized labor unions.

## The Fire at St. Johns.

St. Johns, N. F., July 9.—[By the Asso-ciated Press.]—The fire which broke out here yesterday is still burning. Six hundred buildings are already destroyed, and the loss will reach \$6,000,000. Fifteen thousand people are homeless and desta-tute. All the finest buildings in town are destroyed and it is thought many lives are lost. The English Cathedral, considered to be the finest piece of Gothic architecture on this continent, and which has been in building for fifty years, is also ruined. The people are all paralyzed and the fire department is also powerless, and block after block is being burned with no attemnt made to save them. Thieves entered the deserted houses. The fire this morning broke out among the residences in town, and it looks as if the whole town would be destroyed. Wires are down and, there is destroyed and it is thought many lives are destroyed. Wires are down and there is no communication with the outside world. HALIEAX, N. S., July 9.—At twenty minutes of eight tonight telegraphic communication with St. Johns was restored. The first dispatch received after the wires were again in working order stated the loss by fire was placed at \$20,000,000.
