TRUST DEED LAW ATTACKED.

Friday the Supreme Court Will
Hear Arguments.
Though the extraordinary session of the Ninth seceral assembly is dead and gone it was hoped that its acts might yet live, but now an attempt is to be made to destroy even its acts. Before the supreme court yesterday morning Juke Benedict appeared and gave notice that he desired to attack the constitutionality of the new trust deed law in argument before the court and that he would question the legality of the extraordinary session that enacted the law. The court set the hearing on the question for Friday morning at 10 o'clock, and at that hour will be glad to hear all that the legal fraternity may have to say on the subject, and an invitation is extended to all the lawyers who desire to attend and present argument. Senator Friker, it is announced, will defend the law, and inasmuch as all the other laws are attacked when the legality of the session is questioned it is probable that other lawyers of the legislature will argue in support of the new laws.

Put two quarts of sifted, new process flour into a bread bowl; make a well in the flour and pour in the milk, in which has been dissolved one tablespoonful of butter or clarified drippings, also one cup of lukewarm, in which one-half of a cake of compressed yeast has been dissolved; add one-fourth of a cup of sugar and one teaspoonful of salt.

Fut it in a warm place to rise over night. In the morning stir it up with a knife and let it stand till two hours before the rolls are to be baked. Two hours before baking turn them on to a moulding board and roll as thin as doughnuts; cut into rounds, butter the edges and double them over: place on greased dripping pans, coverciose, that they may not get too dry on the outside, and set in a warm place to itse.

Some War-Time Honnets.

Those were the times which tried men's souls and taxed women's ingenuity. To make old things look like new developed latent power bordering upon genius. The way old sliks were altered and realtered now seems incredible as we think it over. One peculiarity of the femine mind is that no matter how distressed or troubled a woman may be, or how she may be wrought up to the verge of heroics, a new fashlen in dress is always a divession. So it was in the days of my old note-book. A milliner of Atlanta or Savannah would secure a pattern bonnet that had escaped the federal blockaders, and then our country milliners would spare neither trouble nor expense to secure the new style, whereupon we would all institute an instant and diligent search through bureau drawers and old bandboxes for materials required to "fix over." We seldon or never had anything new; it was always "fixed over." I well remember taking my own and my mother's hats to the village milliner on day for reconstruction. "Sky-scrapers" had come, and we must have them. After faithful rummaging I had found a green and-white-checked slik cape for mine, and some larger pieces of purple slik which would answer admirably for mother's. For the superstructure we brought pieces of pastebourd and fragments of old boxes, by means of which the milliner enlarged the old frames and gave them the correct altitude. Some fragments of turiatun produced a stunning rotche, which filled the capacious front of mother's new headgear while mine was made gorgeous by a wreath of feather flowers—my own handlwork. To Make Fine Bread and Rolls.

Here are some recipes which I feel confident will be helpful to many a house-keeper who has been rendered aimost desperate by repeated attempts to make good bread and rolls.

Put two quarts, somewhat heaped, of sifted new process flour into a bread bowl. Make a well in the center, pour in one pint of lukewarm water, in which has been dissolved one tablespoonful of shortening—butter, clarified beef drippings or lard—and one coffee cupful of lukewarm water, in which has been dissolved one-half of a cake of compressed yeast; sift in one medium sized bolied potato, sift in one medium sized bolied potato, front of mother's new hendgear while mine was made gorgeous by a wreath of feather flowers—my own handlwork. Set it again a warm place and let it rise until extremely light, probably three or four hours, according to the temperature. Then carefully divide into two parts with a sharp knife; do not kneed it at all, but form lightly into loaves in the hands. Place in warmed, greased baking pans and set once more to rise. When very light, certainly twice its former size, and air bubbles can be seen through the almost transparent crust, put into a rather hot oven and bake from three-quarters of an hour to an hour. This is a fine recipe for breakfast rolls. knowledgeous."

To Remove White Spots.

The best way of removing the white spots caused by water drops on crepe is an exceedingly simple one. Lay the crepe on a table with a piece of black silk beneath it. Dip a camel's hair brush in ordinary ink and go over the satin. Wipe the ink off with a soft piece of silk. The stain will disappear as soon as the ink dries.
