nd Hand Dealer is Fined for l'ailing to Renew Liceuse.

Joseph Polinsky, senior member of of a second hand firm at No. 511 West Superior street, was in court for

not renewing his license, as required by the city ordinance.

Polinsky was arraigned last week, and his hearing was set for yesterday at his own request. Yesterday he wanted another postponement, but it being apparent that it was only for purpose of delay, Judge Gearhart would not consent. Polinsky then be-came stubborn and refused to plead or take part in the proceedings. After the testimony of the city's witnesses was in he was found guilty and upon suggestion of the assistant city attorney Polinsky was told he might go, upon payment of the costs, \$2.50. But

the offending second hand dealer was not wise in his generation and objected, saying he would not pay even \$2.50. Thereupon the court said: "If you don't want to pay \$2.50 you shall pay \$15." But Polinsky was hard to please and objected more stremously than ever. It was of no avail, however, and rather than go to jail for 10 days, he paid the

The police expressed themselves pleased that Polinsky was given a fair-

ly stiff fine, as they say it may serve as a warning to other second hand dealers in the city. It is complained that they give the authorities the same trouble every year about their licenses and nearly all neglect to renew them until forced to do so. Joseph Connors and Fred Brown were arraigned for assaulting Albert Jackson while all three were in jail. It is alleged that Brown kicked Jackson in the jaw, breaking it in the center. Connors is also charged with taking part

C. Lucia and Christ Doollitle will pound rocks for ten days because
