



On all sides of Duluth, in all parts of the county, homesteads are being taken up and fine farms are being developed. These people are necessarily located far away from the towns and under the present conditions it is impossible for them to reach the bases of supplies, except in winter when sleighing is good.

Such a condition is to be deplored These people, who are doing so much to develop the agricultural interests of the county, should be given roads on which they can reach the towns the year round.

There is now a bill before con gress, which provides for the ap propriation of \$24,000,000 for aid in the construction of good roads in every state in the union. Minnesota's allotment will be \$450,000, if the bill passes, and of that amount, any county making a special appropriation for road building, will be given an amount equal to the appropriation.
