troops. He believes that an effort to turn the discontent of the troops against the Jews will be made by the government upon one pretext or another, but says: "I scarrely believe when these sol-diers find while they have been suffer-ing defeat through the blunders of in-

diers find while they have been suffering defeat through the blunders of incompetent generals this government, for which they have been fighting, has devoted its time to the slaughter of their defenseless families, they will be over-willing to be further guided against a race the representatives of which have succored them in the field. The peasantry will have a grievance, which will not be against the Jews, when they miss their loved ones from the ranks of the returning troops. "The crushing defeat of Russla may lead to a revolution now or it may be deferred, but it is bound to come. Even now there is a strong and growing belief among the members of the financial world of New York that there is something benind the seeming diplomatic lefeat of Japan at Portsmouth.
