the grand jury for grand larceny in the first degree. Kennedy, who is 22 years old, testified at the examination that he came to Duluth three months ago as a deckhand on the steamer Amasa Stone. He is a laborer and his mother lives at 147

Franklin street, Brooklyn. He is a member of the Lake Seamans' union and joined at Manitowoc last August. When questioned about the presence of his clothes in Bellock's grip, Ken-

of his clothes in Bellock's grip, Ken-nedy declared that he gave him the clothes before he left the city on a freight train for St. Paul to go south for the winter. He said he didn't in-tend to pay his fare and could bettee beat his way if not hampered by 10g-gage. According to his testimony he went to St. Paul. The employment agencies would not give him employment without the payment of the cus-

tomary fee and having no money, he boarded a train for Chicago. Then he came back to Duluth. Joseph Altman identified Kennedy as his assailant although when first confronted with the man he was not cer-tain he had seen him before. The oth-
