Mrs. Siegel Arrived in Fargo Last Night

Heartbroken Mother Tells of the Tragic Fate of Her Baby Boy in Mid-Ocean—The Family

A week ago Thursday, the Jews of Fargo were shocked by the startling information, when the steamship, the New Amsterdam, arrived in New York, that while the boat was in mid-ocean, the little 2-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Siegel of this city was deliberately thrown overboard into the ocean by a frenzied governess that was on board the steamer.

The news reached this city, and for a day it was kept from the father, who is in business on lower Front street, but after its confirmation it was told to the father who was almost frantic

The woman with her two children, w boy aged 6 years, and a girl aged 4 years, arrived in Fargo. She was greeted at the depot by her husband, from whom she had been absent for two years, and other relatives. She was taken to the home of Matt Siegel, at 914 Fourth avenue south, who is a brother of the father of the child, and here she unfolded her story, giving a

graphic description of the accident. While relating the terrible expercried as though her heart would break for the scene was recalled to her memory, and will ever be branded upon her mind.

This morning she was seen by a representative of The Forum and through Matt Siegel, her brother-inlaw, she told the story of how her little baby met its death and was interred in a watery grave in mid-ocean out six days on the ocean and that from the time she stepped on board the vessel she was sick. Owing to her illness she was confined to her state room the greater portion of the time while her children, who soon overcame the experience of being on the water enjoyed themselves playing on the deck of the ship. 🐇

On the morning of the accident the boat's physician informed Mrs. Siegel that if she would leave her room and go on the deck she would feel better. The children begged the mother to dress them so that they could so and play with the other children who wars passengers on the steamship.

The pleadings of the children ewere beyed by the fond mother and she

went upon the deck with them. The children on reaching the deck met others and were engaged in their play, when Miss Nagel, who was dressed in black and who, according to the officers of the boat, was a Swiss governess, came on the deck. She espied the little 2-year-old child of Mrs. and was attracted by his appearance. The mother was seated on the deck, nounce and they adopted the name of being somewhat faint from her long siege of illness when the girl picked up the child out of the group of children and taking it up in her arms she hugged him, and the next thing the mother saw was the girl rushing to the edge of the deck and deliberately throw the baby overboard.

Mrs. Siegel stated that she learned that when the girl came on board the boat at Rotterdam she began acting strangely and that she was driven out of the first-class passengers' apartments by the passengers by reason of her queer actions and her condition was reported to the officers on board, but they paid no attention to her Throughout the entire trip she acted strangely and it was pronounced in New York when she was examined that she was demented. She will be taken back to Switzerland.

It is likely that the steamship com pany will be held liable for the fate of the child, owing to the fact that after the girl's condition was reported to the officers it is claimed they did not take any precaution to guard her.

The mother stated that when the girl picked up the child she thought nothing of it, for many passengers on board were fond of the child, owing to his bright and intelligent appearance and because he would converse with persons on board the boat.

When the woman told of the child's actions she broke down and cried bitterly. She said that on the morning of the tragedy the child begged to be of the children and he repeatedly asked his mother how long it would be before they would reach their papa. The child the time when he would meet his father, whom he knew nothing about further than what his mother had told him and he was anxious for the time t come when he would have his father 3 caress him.

Abe Siegel, the father of the child. came to America two years ago. He left his wife and three children suddenly. When he left the child that was thrown overboard was just three days old. The husband and father left his native country when he learned that he had been drafted to go to war and fight against the Japs. Rather than endure the hardships and perhaps never return to his family again. he, like many others of his country-

Upon landing on this side he came to Fargo, where his brothers, Matt and Max were located and in business: Siegel's name in Russia is Gavowsky

but when the Siegel family came to Siegel playing with the other children this country it was found that the their mother, which was Siegel, under which name they have gone since they have been in America.

Mrs. Siegel, the distracted mother, is a bright woman and has a good education. Both of the children are well trained and the mother stated that the child that was thrown overboard was an exceptionally bright boy.
