After hearing the evidence, which was in effect that Mr. Lieberman added thereto by shipping new goods to the city, that he had but a very short term lease of the building in which he was conducting business, etc., Judge Carey imposed a fine of \$25.00 and decreed that before again opening his doors for business he should obtain a licence in accordance with the ordinances

The arrest was the outcome of the petition filed with the city council Tuesday evening, signed by many of the business men of the city, setting forth that the sale as advertised contained misrepresentation of facts; that Mr. Lieberman had paid more for the goods than he advertised, and that he was making misrepresentations to the public in his announcements.
