DAUGHTER TELLS OF CRIME

Says Mother, Now Insane, Killed Hus band in 1906.

Chicago, Nov. 15.—Henry Broden heyer, a jeweler of Madison, Wis. who was found dead near his home in the summer of 1906 and believed to have been murdered by robbers, was killed by his wife, Margaret Broden heyer, now a patient at the Dunning insane asylum here, according to: confession made by Clara Broden heyer, their daughter, to Assistan Chief of Police Schuettler.

The girl, who is eighteen years of age, related to the police her confession of her father's murder by he mother and how she had aided in disposing of the body, how the crime had driven her mother insane and how the terrible story had haunted her. The confession came as a climax to months of investigation conducted by Chicago detectives after Mrs. Brodenheyer and her daughter had fled from Madison to Chicago to escape from the scene of the crime.
