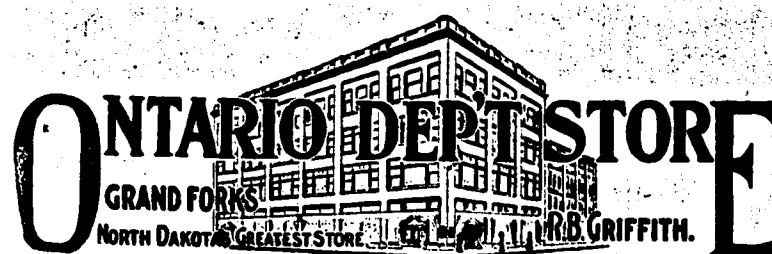

## TO BUILD TUNNEL

Early in January a crew of men will start a tunnel two hundred and fifty feet long, the tunnel to run under the Great Northern track and to connect the big sewer with another across the track. The work on the sewer has now reached Eighth street, extending along the Great Northern right of way from the intersection of DeMers avenue and Seventh street. In order that the sewer may be perfectly safe and not subject to danger of being crushed by the weight of heavy trains above, a large tunnel will be constructed and the earth above supported with a framework of heavy timbers. The tunnel will be about seven feet in diameter and the sewer main will be twenty-three feet beneath the surface. A shaft will be opened in about the middle of the tunnel for convenience in carrying forward the work. This will be the first undertaking of the kind in the northwest and it will take several weeks to complete this portion of the tunnel.

## TWENTY YEARS A BISHOP

Had John Shanley Been Living Today He Would Be Celebrating Great Anniversary

Had the late Bishop John Shanley been alive today he would now be celebrating the twentieth anniversary of his consecration as it was just that many years ago since he was made a bishop. The consecration of Bishop Shanley, together with that of Bishops Cotter and McGolrick, the former of Winona and the latter of Duluth, took place at the same time and of these three Bishop McGolrick is the lone survivor.

When Bishop Shanley was appointed for the Jamestown diocese as it was then known. His appointment was made on December 8, 1889, and his consecration took place on December 27.
