of the range towns, and considerable anxiety was expressed by Mrs. Ginsberg. She has always scorned the idea that her husband has deserted her, saying that he left Duluth because he could

find no work to do here. He is a

shoemaker, and she says he went to the range to find work either at his trade or in any other line of employment that offered itself.

Mr. Ginsberg left Duluth just a
week before the storm deprived him of two of his five children. Information received here yesterday indicates that he did not go to the range

as his wife expected, but that he went westward, landing finally in Seattle. westward, isnaing linaity in Seattle. For this reason it is believed that Mr. Ginsberg has not heard of the death of his children, and every effort is belng made to communicate with him. The three children who survived that steem are helical control of the communication.
