

GINSBERG SAID TO BE IN COAST CITY

Father of Babes Drowned in
Storm at Seattle—Wife in
Hospital and Destitute.

Although Mrs. Ralph Ginsberg, mother of the two babes who were drowned near their home on Ninth avenue east during the cloudburst that visited Duluth two weeks ago today, claims that she has heard no news of her husband since his departure from this city a week before the tragedy, it is said by those interested in relieving the wants of the bereaved mother that he has been located in Seattle.

Mrs. Ginsberg has been at St. Mary's hospital for two or three days, suffering from poisoning in one of her hands resulting from a slight injury received at the time of the big storm. The hospital authorities said yesterday that her injury is not serious, and that she will be able to leave the institution in a day or two.

Soon after the storm had made victims of Mrs. Ginsberg's two youngest children, efforts were made to communicate with the husband, who, she said had left the week before to find work on the range. No trace of him could be found by the police in any of the range towns, and considerable anxiety was expressed by Mrs. Ginsberg.

She has always scorned the idea that her husband has deserted her, saying that he left Duluth because he could find no work to do here. He is a shoemaker, and she says he went to the range to find work either at his trade or in any other line of employment that offered itself.

Mr. Ginsberg left Duluth just a week before the storm deprived him of two of his five children. Information received here yesterday indicates that he did not go to the range as his wife expected, but that he went westward, landing finally in Seattle.

For this reason it is believed that Mr. Ginsberg has not heard of the death of his children, and every effort is being made to communicate with him. The three children who survived the storm are being cared for by friends at 222 East Second street, during their mother's confinement in St. Mary's hospital.
