

ROBT. MUSKE BUILDING

Kidder Street Building Being Fixed Up For Implement House

The foundations for the addition to the old Windsor hotel building, on corner of Kidder and Bay streets, which Robert Muske purchased a short time ago, has practically been completed, and the work on the building proper will be commenced at once. The addition will be 40x80 feet and two stories high. The main building will be remodeled, in both the first and second stories, and together with the addition being constructed will be fixed up into a first class building for the Robert Muske Implement house, which he will move from its present quarters on corner of Kidder street and First avenue southeast. Mr. Muske expects to have the building completed so that he can move into it about November 1st.

SHOULD SAVE MEN

Vasaly Takes Issue With Illinois Chaplain on Subject of Penology

Pioneer Press: (Aug 29) "The new science of penology, which prison officials are trying to apply is an effort to save the men if possible," said Chas. E. Vasaly of the State Board of Control yesterday in commenting on the statement of Rev. Isaiah Villars, chaplain of Joliet. Villars said recently while in the Twin City there is no place inside prison walls for specialists and scientists who wish to apply so-called sociological principles in the solution of prison problems. He said the expression of sentimental sympathy is harmful to the sentimental men because it gives them the impression they are not such bad fellows after all, and minimizes the crime and makes them believe they are not such great sinners against God and society as some would have them believe.

"The science of penology is no effort to minimize the crime," said Mr. Vasaly. "It is an effort to reform the men if possible and to treat them so that when they get out they will not say that society has ever done anything for them and that they are going to have vengeance on society for the confinement."

"The reverend gentleman admits that loss of liberty is the greatest punishment to the men. That is undoubtedly true. Having thus punished the prisoners, should it not be the duty of the state to try and save the men for better lives if possible. There is no sentimentality in this."
