

WILL HAVE LARGE COLLEGE QUOTA

Big Representation From Duluth to Begin Higher Educational Work in a Few Days.

Of the 113 students who were members of the Duluth Central high school class of 1910, the great majority have announced that they will take up studies in higher institutions of learning in a few days. The bulk will go to the University of Minnesota, which will open Sept. 12. A number will go to Macalaster, Hamline and Carleton.

Most of the higher educational institutions in the country will open on the 12th, 13th or 14th. A very few will not open until the 20th. Smith college will open the 21st.

Local high school authorities have been informed that Duluth will send girl students to Vassar, Wellesley, Smith and Wells. Duluth will also be represented at Cornell university, University of Wisconsin and University of Michigan, the class of 1910 contributing both men and women for these three institutions.

One of the reasons for the heavy drift to the University of Minnesota is because of its proximity to Duluth and the fact that the tuition is as low as the state can consistently make it. Moreover, it is well known that its work has been broadening in every line and its reputation as a school steadily increasing.
