But There'll Be No Organization Unless Ten Thousand Join.

'TO SPREAD GOSPEL OF HEALTFUL LIVING"

Physical Director Wegener Enlisting Duluth Members of Association in Movement.

To spread the gospel of healthful living is the object of a proposed organization of national, or international, scope that is to be organized in connection with the Young Men's branch of which is now being recruited at the Duluth association building. It is to be known as the Y. M. C. A. Health league and there will be no organization unless 10,000 nembers are secured, a membership which it is hoped to secure before

the first of January. While the plan originated with the physical department of the interna-tional committee of the Y. M. C. A. and will be affiliated with it, it will e by no means limited to that and in fact one of the attainments hoped for is the dissemination of health in-formation and interest in right living far beyond Y. M. C. A. circles. It is merely planned to make use of the excellent and far-scattered equipment organization of the Y. M. C. A. for this purpose.

The league will have two chief objects: health education and health service. Membership fees of \$1 a. year will entitle members to a number of standard books on health matters, printed matter and health pamphlets to be issued regularly by the

On the service side there will be departments of personal hygiene, sex hygiene, child hygiene, shop hygiene, recreation and play grounds, swimming and life saving, public hygiene, and health information. In all of these departments systematic campaigns will be conducted and literature and lantern slides sent out from l eadquarters.

"There is no battle so worthy of warring as the battle against illhealth, inefficiency and physical de-generation," say the promoters. "A high death rate in any community means a high sickness rate and these mean a high degree of poverty, of inefficiency and of immorality."

A. B. Wegener, physical director at the local association, is enlisting the league members in this city.
