MUSIC

The musical season of 1910-1911 in Duluth will be the most important in the city's history. Musical appreciation during the last four years has had a steady growth, and gradually, yet surely, Duluth is taking its rightful place as an art center. Much of this growth in the appreciation of music is due to the efforts of these musical enthusiasts, Stephen H. Jones, T. W. Hugo and Horace W. Heyner, who, during the last few years have provided Duluth with a fine series of orchestral concerts. This season the committee of three has arranged for a course of high class concerts such as has never been attempted in this city. The season will be opened by Mme. Melba on Thursday, October 13. Melba is conceded to be the greatest soprano of the age and also the most expensive. She is to tour the north-west of Canada during this month. From Fort William west and in many towns the houses have been sold out. The price of seats at her concert in Canada range as high as \$10 a seat in some places. At her concert in Duluth, Mme. Melba will be assisted by Albert Querrel, one of the tenors of the Metropolitan Opera company, Ada Sassoli, harpist; John Lemmon, flautist, and Maurice Le-farge, pianist.

For Thursday, November 3, the famous Russian dancers, Mme. Anna Pavlova, Michael Bjorkin and the Imperial Russian ballet are announced. This group of dancers, described as the most wonderful in the world, will present what is known as "secular opera" or "opera in action" with an ensemble of 60 people. They also carry their own orchestra and musical director. This is one of the grandest attractions that will be offered this season and will be a revelation in an art of which little is known in this country. The series will conclude with three grand Symphony concerts to be given by the St. Paul Symphony orchestra on January 16 and 17 with Walter H. Rothwell conductor, at which the famous Spanish boy pianist, Pepito Ariola, will appear.
