

# SUIT AGAINST THEATER OWNER

Ole O. Kolstad Sues William M.  
Abrahamson to Recover  
Property.

SAYS DEFENDANT GOT  
FIXTURES ILLEGALLY

W. F. Wright, Who Disposed of  
Articles, Charged With  
Unlawful Action.

---

William M. Abrahamson, owner of motion picture and vaudeville houses in Duluth, was made the defendant in a suit instituted in the district court yesterday by Ole O. Kolstad, to recover various theatrical fixtures, which W. F. Wright is said to have sold to him illegally. The value of the property is estimated at \$2,000.

According to the petition the action is the result of a business deal between the plaintiff and Wright. Kolstad says that he bought the property from Ella Crowley for \$2,200, and it was used at the Princess theater, 2023 West Superior street. On July 14, according to Kolstad, he borrowed \$250 from Wright, giving an assignment of the property and a promissory note as security for payment within 30 days. On July 25 he again borrowed from Wright, this time \$100 on 60 days' time, giving a promissory note and a bill of sale with the understanding that Wright was to have the property if the money was not paid.

When the money was due, the petition states, Kolstad did not at once make payment and Wright took possession of the property. Then Kolstad paid the interest and \$500, considerably more than the amount of the two notes, but Wright refused to give back the property and sold it without starting proceedings for foreclosure. Action is brought to recover the property, which is now in the possession of Abrahamson.
