

holds dear and he played it accordingly. It was an interpretation in which technical proficiency of a high order was blended with breadth and nobility of emotional utterance. It is an exacting task to reveal the spiritual contents of this work to their fullest, but Mr. Borchard accomplished it with honor. His Chopin gave much pleasure, though, as was stated at his first appearance here, it is French and not Polish. He was especially successful in the Valse, which French grace and delicacy besit to a marked degree.

The Liszt and Reger numbers received their due at Mr. Borchard's hands. The "Soiree de Vienne," played with lovely tone and supreme charm, called forth enthusiastic applause. The Reger work is, of course, not comparable to the former in musical value, but it was delivered with finish of phrasing and beauty of tone truly noteworthy. Mr. Borchard was recalled again and again to acknowledge the applause of his hearers.
