The opening meeting will be devoted to the classics, Beethoven and Schubert will be the composers, whose familiar music will give the keynote of enthusiasm.

November, the symphony to be played by the Minneapolis orchestra will be analyzed and played, and the vocal work will be the consideration of public school music, and the development of child-song, suitably illustrated.

The chief numbers of the December meeting will be Brahms's Festival overture, and for voice, Christmas carols.

In January, Brahms's Symphony No. 4, will be analyzed by Miss Josephine Carey and the relation of folk-song to art-song will be considered and illustrated by art songs used in modern programs.

MUSIC

If the first two weeks' advance subscription is any criterion, Duluth's series of concerts arranged for by Stephen H. Jones, T. W. Hugo and Horace W. Reyner, promise to be an exceptional success. The subscription is away ahead of last year, which speaks well for Duluth's growth in matters musical. The movement to hear the great operatic artists, which has swept this country has been met by the artists of the Metropolitan, Boston and Chicago Opera Companies, taking short tours before the opening and at the close of the opera season, and those who will be heard in Duluth in this series of concerts are: Alice Nielsen and Ricardo Martin with Mlle. Jeska Swartz, Mme. Johanna Morella, Sig. Luigi Cilla, Sig. Rodolfo Fornari and Sig. Jose Gardones of the Boston Opera, a grand operatic concert, partly in costume, on Monday, Oct. 16th. Mme. Frances Alda, the wife of the Gatti-Casazza, of the Metropolitan Opera, will give an operatic and ballad recital on Jan. 15th, and Alessandro Bonci, of the Metropolitan, Manhattan, Covent Garden and Buenos Ayres Opera Companies who stands first in the ranks of the world's lyric tenors, will be here on March 19th, just previous to his southern tour. Bonci will be busy in opera in Europe until the end of December. His opening recital in this country will be given in New York early in January. Besides these great artists three concerts and a special matinee for children will be given in November by the Minneapolis Symphony Orchestra, under the direction of Emil Oberhofer.
