# EVELETH AUDITORIUM OPENING A RANGE EVENT

Spacious Armory-Auditorium in Neighboring City Formally Dediture Attracts Huge Range Aud- winter ience-Addresses by State Senator Boyle, Adjutant General Wood, J. H. Hearding, Mayor Jacob S. Saari and Others Attract Much Attention-George E. Jensen, Virginia Soloist, Capitavates Crowd With Two Vocal Numbers\_Titanic and Olympic Busses Convey Scores of Virginians to Eveleth, While Local Militiamen Also Make the Trip-Virginians Desire Similar Structure—Friendly Feeling Exists Between the Two Towns and Street Car Line Will Make the Eveleth Building a Range Meeting Place.

The new \$30,000 Eveleth armoryauditorium was opened in a blaze of glory Friday evening in the presence of a thousand range residents who were more than surprised by the splendor of the structure which is the most modern building on the range. About a hundred Virginians made the trip to Eveleth and were well pleased with the opening cere-

Following a parade down Jones street from the Glode Hotel to the armory on Jackson street, which was headed by the City Band followed by the militia, speakers and others, the auditorium was formally thrown open to the public. After an inspection of the building, which is 50 by 120 feet and modern in every particular, the opening ceremonies were started with Mayor Jacob S. Saari presiding.

President Joseph S. Wilson, of the Eveleth city council, told of the history of the structure and of the cost of it's erection. He was followed by George E. Jensen, this city, who gave two beautiful solos accompanied by Miss Edith Helegson, pianist, both numbers being warmly applauded. Assistant General Manager John H. He told of the work done by the state militia and then branched off into a short talk on the Eveleth armory-auditorium, telling of the building's purpose and that it would be a "common meeting place." His oratory was of the best and as usual won much applause.

Music was furnished by the Flaaten orchestra of twelve pieces with Henry Lavick, brother of James Lavick, this city, assisting in the leading, he playing the violin. Following the program, Major Hubert V. Eva, Duluth, inspected Co. F., assisted by Adjutant General Fred B. Wood. The soldiers made a good appearance and went through a short manual of arms. The evening ceremonies closed with a ball, many Virginians participating.
