Judge Dibell has granted a new trial in the case of the S. L. Boutin Fish company against Hyman Y. Josephs. Max Zalk and Louis Zalk, doing business as the Duluth Machinery company. A verdict in favor of the defendants had been awarded for \$895.43.

ernment inspection and they asked judgment for \$1,286.14. The machinery dealers alleged that the order had been filled on time and the equipment accepted. It was no fault of theirs that the machinery would not pass inspection, they claimed, as the tur owners had never given them certain specifications for having a boiler and fittings built that

would come up to federal requirements. They asked the court to award them an amount still due on the

\$1,820.

In granting the new trial Judge Dibell made the following memorandum. "The case presents many difficulties to a satisfactory trial. Upon a review. of the elvdence I find I committed an error in directing a verdict. There were some questions of fact should have been submitted to the
