

# HAD A GREAT TIME AND THEN WOKE UP

## Earl Lanore, in Court, Admits Forging Checks While on Spree. Other Police Court Cases.

Earl Lanore, charged with forgery, waived examination when brought into municipal court yesterday and held to the grand jury. Lanore told the court he was ready to plead guilty. He is said to have forged a number of checks Wednesday and gone out for a big spree on the proceeds. Lanore claims Hibbing as his home.

Robert Lindsay, negro, charged with assaulting his wife at their home Monday night was convicted and given 30 days in the county jail. Mrs. Lindsay appeared as complaining witness. She told the court he beat her because she refused to go about the streets picking the pockets of persons with whom she came in contact. The judge fined Lindsay a total of \$46, which he was unable to raise, so accepted the jail alternative.

Hugh Wilson, the 17-year-old boy arrested in connection with the burglary of the Fiebigger hardware store, 129 East Superior street, Feb. 4, waived examination. He was held to the grand jury. Arthur Beauchemin, a pal of Wilson's, was bound over Wednesday.

Andrew Dahl pleaded not guilty of larceny when arraigned yesterday and will be tried Feb. 16. Peter Claussen is the complaining witness against Dahl. Claussen claims he met Dahl on the Bowery Tuesday afternoon and the pair became great friends following a few rounds of drinks. Dahl offered to find Claussen a job as porter in a West End hotel and collected \$10 from him as the employment fee. Later, declares Claussen, Dahl came round and borrowed \$5 more on the strength of their friendship. Still later Dahl returned and sold Claussen a life insurance policy for \$4 to protect him against mishap while performing the duties of his imaginary job. Claussen caused Dahl's arrest the next morning.

In the civil section of the court Max Sosnovsky began suit against Julius Merzowski and David Polinsky for \$300 alleged to be due him on a purchase of goods for which he garnished the defendants. The case will be completed today.
