

SEVEN MEN SAY 'GUILTY' TO JUDGE

Prisoners Accused of Crime by
the May Grand Jury Are
Arraigned.

FOURTEEN TELL COURT THEY ARE INNOCENT

Clark N. Hamilton, Accused of
Embezzlement, May Secure
Bonds From Friends.

When formally arraigned in Judge Dancer's room in district court yesterday afternoon, seven prisoners, accused by the May grand jury of having committed various offenses, entered pleas of guilty. They will be sentenced later. The names of those who confessed guilt are:

John Silamps, second degree grand larceny; Mane Pupavach, assault in the first degree; Carl Covel, second degree grand larceny; Peter Morozowski, second degree grand larceny; Axel Hancer, grand larceny second degree; William A. Gansburg and Joseph Davis for receiving stolen property.

Fourteen other prisoners, who were arraigned at the same time on charges preferred by the grand jury entered pleas of not guilty, and will be tried at this term of district court. Among them was Vernon R. Bell, who is charged with having attempted to burn his house at West Duluth to collect insurance money amounting to \$200, and Joseph and John Marshall and J. D. and Reuben Wilson, who are accused of stealing timber. John B. Lessard, suspected of being the man who burglarized the McEwen store at Proctor also declared his innocence.

Clark N. Hamilton, formerly employed by the People's Brewing company of this city, and who is accused of having embezzled \$2,000 from that concern, stoutly declared that he is not guilty as charged. Hamilton's friends are now arranging to have him released on bonds.
