

ZION PIONEER TO BE HONORED

MAX SHULMAN.



**Herzl Memorial Meeting Will Be
Held at Adas Israel Temple
Next Wednesday.**

**ABLE SPEAKERS WILL
DELIVER THE ADDRESSES**

**Max Shulman of Chicago and B.
Herowitz, Recently of Colum-
bia College, on Program.**

A massmeeting arranged by Ohave Zion Gate of Duluth, to commemorate the death of Dr. Theodor Herzl, founder of the Zionist movement, will be held Wednesday evening, July 17, at 8 o'clock at the Adas Israel synagogue, Third avenue east and Third street.

This meeting will afford the Jewish people of the city an opportunity to pay tribute to the memory of the great leader of the Jewish National cause. The publication in 1896 of Dr. Herzl's "Jewish State" aroused all Judaism throughout the land to see the need of a publicly secured and legally assured home in Palestine. Since that time, Zionist societies whose chief aim is the realization of the plan outlined by Dr. Herzl, have been organized in all parts of the world. A great deal has already been accomplished in the way of colonizing Palestine and establishing there a Jewish educational center. Zionism has gained a strong foothold among the cultured Jewish people in America and abroad, whose services are invaluable to the cause.

The Zion Gate of Duluth feels fortunate in being able to secure such prominent men in the Zionist movement as Max Shulman and B. Horowitz to speak on this occasion, as both are enthusiastic Zionist workers. Mr. Shulman, a prominent attorney of Chicago and grandmaster of the Zionist organization, is an able and eloquent speaker as well as an ardent Zionist worker. He was a delegate to the tenth Zionist congress held at Basle last August and at that time also visited the principal cities in Palestine and was much impressed with the progress made there.

B. Horowitz, who is spending his vacation in Duluth with his parents, Rev. and Mrs. E. Horowitz, 221 East Third street, is a graduate of Columbia college, having received his M. A. degree last month. Perhaps one of the most influential Zionist societies in existence is maintained at the Columbia college by Jewish young men and women numbering about 100, in which are included members from about a half dozen nearby colleges. The standard of admittance to this particular society is a degree from any of the leading colleges. Mr. Horowitz is one of the leading members of this society and is also a contributor to the Maccabean, a monthly paper published in English in New York City and devoted solely to Zionism.
