

JEW TO OBSERVE NEW YEAR TODAY

Begins at Sundown and Continues
Until Some Time Tomorrow.
Services at Synagogues.

From sundown this evening until the same time tomorrow, orthodox and reformed Jews throughout the city will observe Rosh Hashanah or New Years day, which begins the year 5673, according to the Hebraic calendar.

At this time, all of the Jews of the city will lay aside their labors, and gather at the synagogues to pray. At the conclusion of the services this evening, expressions of good wishes for the coming year will be made.

The same services, which are in the nature of a self-arraignment before God, will be held tomorrow. Following the church services most of the older men and women of the orthodox congregations will meet on the shore of Lake Superior where the interesting ceremony of Tashlich, or the casting of the sins into the water, will be solemnized.

Yom Kippur, the Day of Atonement, will begin Friday evening, Sept. 20, at 5 o'clock and close at sundown the next day with the blowing of the ram's horn. This day is one of self-punishment and the more pious of the Jews maintain a rigid fast during the entire 24 hours. Neither food nor drink is taken until the blowing of the Shofar following the Nellah services.

New Year's sermons will be delivered at the Adas Israel synagogue, Third avenue East and Third street, and the Temple Emanuel, Seventh avenue East and Second street, by Rabbis Tepnitz and Lefkovitz.
