Executors Will Go Before Judge Gilpin Tomorrow With the Final Accounting.

LATE LIQUOR DEALER
LEFT FORTUNE OF \$100,000

Testament Was Source of Litigation Before Dibell—Carried

to Supreme Court.

The executors of the will of Jacob D. Zien, who died at his home in Duluth, Jan. 10, 1909, will submit the final accounting of the estate to Pro-

bate Judge Gilpin tomorrow.

When Mr. Zien died he left a liquor
business and the Frederick hotel,
Second avenue East and First street.
He also left a homestead in the
suburbs of the city. His entire hold-

ings were valued at \$100.000.

He willed the homestead and a life interest in the Frederick hotel to his wife, Mrs. Matilda Zien, and the remainder of the estate to his brother, Isaac Zien of Milwaukee. When the will came up for probate it was found that the debts against the hotel amounted to the value of the homestead, \$10,000.

Judge Middlecoff decided that the remaining interest in the hotel should be sold to pay the debts and that Mrs. Zien was entitled to all the will left her.

Isaac Zien appealed to the district court but Judge Dibell sustained Judge Middlecoff's decision. The case was then appealed to the supreme court, but a decision sustaining that of Judge Dibell was handed down.

Mr. Zien then paid the debts in
cash, retaining his share of the ininterest in the hotel, and entitling
him to entire ownership on the death
of Mrs. Zien.
