Analyzing the Barker methods and ideals, Mrs. Taylor said: "Ilis aim has not been to please so much as to win the interest and understanding of intelligent men and women. On the contrary, he incored the traditions of play-making and cast aside the pattern by which ordinary plays are fashioned in his eagerness to attract the attention of thinking people to the message he wished to convey."

Discussing some prevalent phases of modern drama, Mrs. Taylor said: "The moderns continue in advance of the thought of their times. Their characters do not merely express current thought, but they go before—evangels of new thought and conditions. The men and women whom the modern playwright shows us not only reflect the sairti of the age, but break new ground, clear the way for new conditions and project themselves into the future, leading the way to a development that we will reach later—perhaps not until the next generation."
