Picking is now rapidly nearing completion and ginners and receiving points can begin to estimate with a fair degree of accuracy what is left of the crop to be handled. This information will allow a new angle of view and will be awaited with interest by the trade. This week Thursday ends the present ginning period, in the schedule of census reports, and these figures will be used to check up opinions formed regarding the crop based on preceding statistics. New York, Nov. 9 .- "The real test and measure of a university's effi-ciency are not the number of students enrolled, the size of its endowment or the magnificence of its physical equip-ment," President Nicholas Murray But-ler of Columbia university, says in his annual report to the trustees made annual report to the trustees, made public today. "The true test and measure are to be found in the productive scholarship of the university's teachers and in the quality of the men and women who go out with the stamp of the university's approval upon them."

President Butler makes this statement in calling attention to press statements that Columbia is entitled, because of its size, to claim precedence over other institutions at home and abroad. There are 13,120 students entitled in all classes, yet within the university no feeling prevails such as that

versity no feeling prevails such as that described, Dr. Butler asserts.

During the year, gifts to the university amounted to a little more than \$1,

The report contains a striking fea ture which President Butler calls "the stupendous change in the relations between the university and the public." He mentions that the gifts received by Columbia from 1754 to 1890, a period of 136 years, did not exceed in value \$200,000, while during the administration of President Butler, which began in 1902, \$20,300,000 has been given the institution. ture which President Butler calls institution.
