Var Baalen, who was shot to death by Leaf Alexander, a milliner, in a fit of fealous frenzy, has returned to San Francisco to attend the trial of her husband's slayer. The Alexander woman and Van Baalen were intimate for over a year. When he ceased showering his attentions upon her to give them to some other woman not his wife, she shot him to death in his office in the presence of several terrified witnesses. At that time Mrs. Van Baalen was visiting in Minnesota.

A striking contrast to the Alexander woman is the widow of Van Baalen. Siender and wistful-eyed, Mrs. Van Baalen is the embodiment of patient loyalty which suffers in silence the realization of a truth which she will not admit aloud. Of Different Type.

She has none of the dash and the fire which characterize the Titian-haired woman whose fate now hangs in the balance. Mrs. Van Baalen is crushed and dazed, but not as the shock of Van Baalen's death. She can scarcely believe that her husband's life has been snuffed out by a jealous wo-man.
