Capitalized at \$25,000 with shares at \$100 each, articles of incorporation yesterday were filed with the register of deeds by The Miller Store company of Ely. The company will engage in a general merchandise business. Frank Crassweller, president; Arthur H. Crassweller, vice president, and Elmer E. Blu, secretary and treasurer, are the officers, incorporators and first board of directors.

## Suit Involves Less Than \$40.

Alleging that A. Anderson and Emma C. Anderson owe him a balance of \$39.66 for building supplies provided for a dwelling house in Norton's addition to Duluth, Leon Fox yesterday began suit in district court to have the property sold to satisfy the debt. Fox asks the court to declare his claim a lien on the property.

## Probate Court Kept Busy.

Rev. A. W. Ringland, formerly pastor of the First Presbyterian church of Duluth, who gave up the ministry to become president of Manchester college, has reentered the pulpit. Dr. Ringland is now pastor of the First Presbyterian church of Denison, Texas.

## Sues For Loss of Team.

Alleging negligence on the part of Whitney Brothers, contractors, for failing to place a danger signal at an ice hole near a dock which they were constructing into the bay Feb. 24, the West Duluth & Duluth Transfer company is demanding \$650 damages for the loss of a team of horses which were killed by falling through the ice. Trial of the suit was resumed before a jury in Judge Cant's division of district court yesterday.

## Of Interest to Lawyers.

Captain Pressnell, clerk of the United States district court, announced yesterday that in cases to be removed from state courts hereafter the filing of note of issue will be required as in original cases brought in the federal court. Captain Pressnell said that this is in accordance with the new judicial code and will have to be observed in order to have the cases placed on the calendar for the next term of court.
