## Fire Breaks Out Again.

## Sues for \$2,000.

Claiming that C. J. West called him a thief, coupled with vile epithets, Abraham Y. Litman is suing for \$2,000 damages in district court before Judge Ensign. The case was opened yesterday afternoon. Litman claims that the injury done his good name by being publicly called a thief cannot be remedied for less than the amount, for which he sues.

## Accused of \$479 Theft.

The hearing of Elmer McLean and Joseph Blais who were arrested charged with having relieved Adolph Monty, a Canadian teamster of \$479 will probably take place in the municipal court this afternoon. Monty was separated from his roll while intoxicated. Both prisoners deny their guilt. The father of McLean is on his way to Duluth from North Dakota and may fight the charge and attempt to prove his son's innocence.

## Railroad Men Here.

J. A. Chandler, St. Paul, traveling passenger agent for the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul railway; W. G. Mitsch, St. Paul, northwestern passenger agent for the Chicago & Great Western; H. F. Carter, Minneapolis, district passenger agent for the Union Pacific railway, and William H. Snyder St. Paul, traveling passenger agent for the Burlington road, are in Duluth on business.

## Going Into Canada.

Over 25 settlers from different points throughout the east, left Duluth last night bound for western Canada. They left on the Duluth, Missabe & Northern and the Canadian Northern roads, and will settle in Alberta and Saskatchewan. George W. Alexander, city ticket agent of the Duluth, Missabe & Northern, said yesterday that this is but a starter, and that he expects to see nearly twice that number leave next Tuesday. There are special rates given by the roads on each Tuesday, and a through sleeper is operated between Duluth and western Canadian joints.

## Engine Sparks Caused Fire.

Another of the famous White Iron Lake fire cases was heard before Judge W. A. Cant in district court yesterday. It was that of Victor Stromberg against the Duluth & Iron Range Railroad company. Mr. Stromberg claims that on April 16, 1909, a Duluth & Iron Range engine scattered sparks that caused his tract of timber to burn. This was at the time of the Adriatic mine fires and Mr. Stromberg claims it was owing to the negligence of the defendant company that his timber burned. There are 36 cases similar to this one, but each suit will be tried separately.
