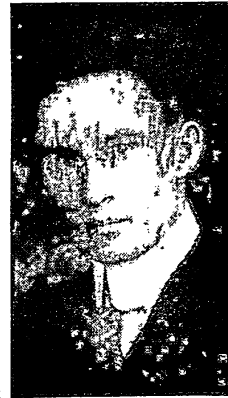
DULUTH STUDENTS WHO GRADUATE FROM STATE UNIVERSITY THIS SPRING

SENIORDOM at the state university of Minnesota is in the last gay whirl of parties, class picnics, rehearsals for senior play, arrangements for commencement, and alas for those unfortunates who have fallen below grade just once in their studies during the three last years for final examinations. Amid this rush of mingled frivolity and hard labor are eight sons and daughters of Duluth who are living up to the ancient tradition handed down from time immemorial at the university, that "if it comes from Duluth, it must be good."

"Senior week" is, of course, of most importance, as all the big events from the senior promenade to the commencement exercises themselves are included in its scope. Duluth boasts among its eight seniors, five who have

been appointed by the all-university senior joint council to important senior committees. Miss Myrna Pressnell, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. T. H. Pressnell, 6 Munger Terrace, has been made chairman of the arrangements committee for the senior class play; Robert Ely, son of Mrs. Henry Ely, who is spending the winter in Minneapolis, is chairman of the program committee for commencement week; John Jenswold, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Jenswold Jr., 5820 London road, has the honor of being chairman of the floor committee for the senior promenade; Leonard McHugh, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. C. McHugh, 1424 East First street, was appointed to the general social committee of the senior class, and Lawrence Jaques, son of Mr. and Mrs. Alfred Jaques, 1205 East Third street, has

served on the senior informal committee for the year.

"Commencement week" will begin Friday, June 6, with the class play, "Maidling It for Ma," given two days in succession at one of the downtown theaters. Miss Myrna Pressnell, who has a reputation for character parts, will appear in one of the title roles, "Sarah," the cook, and as there are only 12 character parts in the play, the honor is apparent. Introduced into the play will be a number of "specialties," or choruses. Miss Rose Guinn, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. I. S. Guinn, 112 East Superior street, will be one of the chorus named the "Aesthetic dancers," and Miss Ruth Hanson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Swan Hanson, 1414 East Fifth street, will be in the "Argentine Belles" group. Owing to the press of studies, Miss

Marion Fee, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Fee, 423 Third avenue East, will not be able to take part in the play.

On Sunday, June 8, President Emeritus Cyrus Northrop will address the entire class, who appear in cap and gown at the baccalaureate exercises in the university armory.

Class day will fall on Monday, June 9. Since it is at this time that class prophecies are read, and class orations and poems delivered, class day is always popular.

Tuesday evening, June 10, will be given over to the final social event of the college course—the senior promenade—which is open to under graduates as well as seniors.

A committee of alumni has cooperated with the senior committee on alumni day to make Wednesday,

June 11, the most memorial reunion day that has ever been held at the university campus.

The Swedish ambassador to United States will come to Minneapolis from Washington to deliver the commencement address on Thursday, June 11, at 10:30 in the morning.

It does not take long for the campus to look dejected and deserted after the commencement exercises are over. Grips and trunks are packed and waiting so that afternoon trains can be caught without delay. All of the eight Duluth seniors will return to their "home town" after the week is completed, and most of them will spend the summer or part of the summer recuperating before slashing boldly forth into the big, wide world, or returning to school for further education.

Both Lawrence Jaques and John Jenswold, who have taken law along with their senior academic work, will return to the University of Minnesota, or go elsewhere to complete their law course. Both have received many of the same honors during their stay at the university, being members of the junior ball association during their junior year and belonging to the Tillikum club—the association of senior fraternity men. Mr. Jaques is a member of the Sigma Chi fraternity, and Mr. Jenswold belongs to the Delta Tau Delta.

Robert Ely will graduate from the College of Mines, and he will spend the summer in this city with his mother before taking a position in the fall. While at the university, Mr. Ely belonged to the "Masquers," the university dramatic club to the Goph-

er board, and to the Sigma Alpha Epsilon and Sigma Rho fraternities.

Leonard McHugh, also a member of the Sigma Alpha Epsilon fraternity, will come back to Duluth for a visit before determining his plans in taking up the practice of law.

The girls who will receive their sheepskins intend following up the line of least resistance, which means that they will teach school. Miss Rose Guinn, who was the only Duluthian among the 24 seniors honored with Phi Beta Kappa election, will teach in Red Wing. Miss Myrna Pressnell, Miss Marion Fee and Miss Ruth Hanson have been highly recommended by the faculty of the university, and will be located by the Sigma Alpha Delta, junior society, and of the Delta Gamma.
