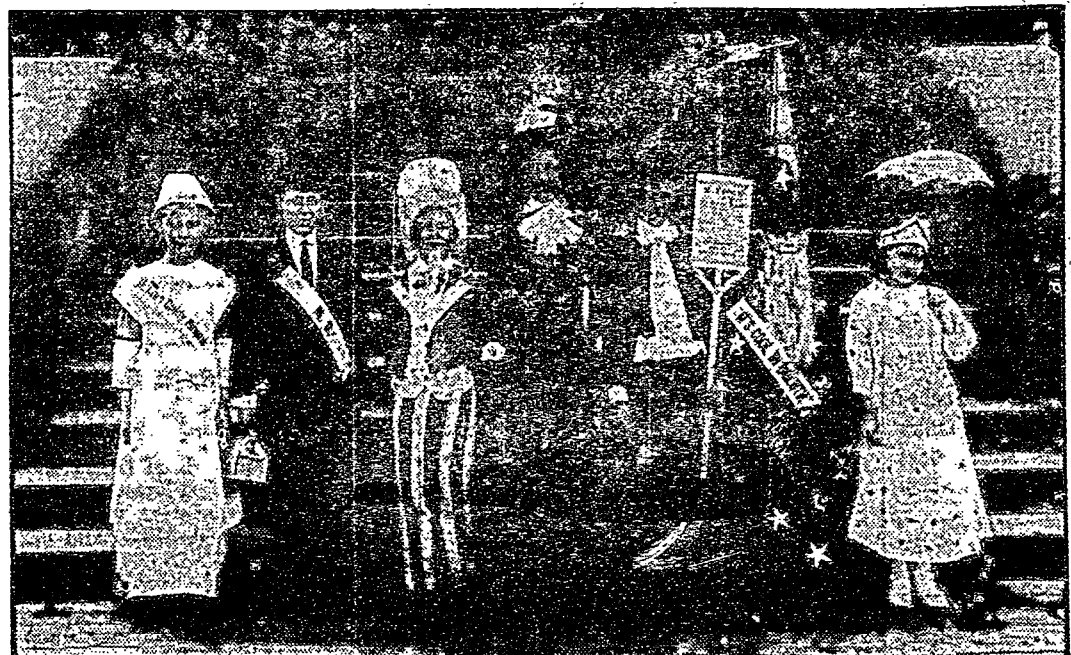


# FLAG DAY COMES SATURDAY; CHILDREN WILL HAVE PARADE

At the meeting of the Red, White and Blue society yesterday afternoon, arrangements for Flag day were completed. The young people will meet at 10 o'clock sharp next Saturday morning opposite the city hall, Second avenue East and Superior street, and proceed to Sixth avenue West and Superior street, turning and marching to Second avenue West, where they will go to their various stations.

A salute to the flag will be given when they form at Second avenue East. The parade will be headed by mounted police and the music will be furnished by Capt. Asa Daly's fife and drum corps. Chief Quartermaster

Erickson of the U. S. navy will carry the flag, and next will come Uncle Sam and Columbia. Forty-eight girls as states, will lead, and will be followed by four territories. Sieur du Lhut will be followed by the weather man, who will wear a placard bearing the legend: "It's Cool in Duluth." The nurse and clergyman will complete the parade.

At 1 o'clock luncheon will be served at the Glass Block tea rooms, from where the children will go to the First National bank, where the proceeds will be counted and deposited. The first encouragement the society has received was from Miss Belle F. Calverly, principal of the Jefferson school, who purchased in advance

several dozen flags.

It was decided at yesterday's meeting to hold the meetings during the months of July, August and September in the parks. The young people will take a trip to Nopeming sanitarium in the near future to entertain the children. The society wishes to give its love and service to Duluth.

The officers of the Red, White and Blue society are Alice Gow, president; Genevieve Dahl, vice president; Viola Palmquist, secretary, and Mrs. Josef Longren, treasurer. Mrs. Longren is the guiding spirit of the organization. The proceeds of Flag day are intended for the proposed new county hospital.
