Two more Virginia babies have been added to the death list caused by ilio colitis from which a large number of local infants have been suffering. Yesterday Mamie, the 10-months daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Matkovich of 108 Ash street, and Violet, the infant daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James Jensen, died of the disease.

Dies of Consumption.
