Woman Who Escaped Massacre Dies at Age of Ninety-four.

Mrs. Maria Fadden, ninety-four years old, a survivor of the Sioux Indian massacre of Southern Minnesota in 1862, the second white woman to settle in Grand Forks county, N. D., and a homesteader when ninety years old, is dead at Arvilla, N. D.

No career more picturesque could be imagined than that of Mrs. Fadden from the time that she and her husband settled at Henderson, this state, more than sixty years ago.

At the time of the Sioux massacre Mrs. Fadden escaped and saved her children from death by hiding then about the homestead.

Mr. and Mrs. Fadden and their children removed to North Dakota in 1871. making the trip through the Red River valley in one of the historic Red River valley carts.
