

13 ARE INDICTED BY GRAND JURY

January Body Investigates 28
Criminal Cases—Three Secret
Indictments Returned.

TRIO IN FINGER PRINT BURGLARY CASE HELD

Mike Miselberg Must Stand Trial
for Shooting and Wounding
Former Sweetheart.

After investigating 28 criminal cases the January grand jury made its final report to District Judge Fesler yesterday. Thirteen indictments and one no true bill were returned. Three of the indictments are secret until the defendants are arrested. This makes a total of 24 indictments and four no true bills which have been returned for the term. Owing to the illness of County Attorney Green, his first assistant, Mason M. Forbes, attended the jury yesterday.

The jury made quick work of the evidence presented against Charles R. Cherrier, Samuel Hood and Oscar Dahl, alleged to have broken into the storeroom of the Zenith Furnace company Dec. 31. The three were held for the grand jury in police court yesterday morning. After considering the finger-print evidence obtained against Cherrier from a beer bottle left in the storeroom and other evidence against Hood and Dahl, the jury indicted them on a third degree burglary charge.

Other Indictments.

Other indictments returned yesterday were as follows: Mike Miselberg, assault in the first degree. He shot Sarah Berzon on the night of Nov. 10. They had been sweethearts, but had quarreled. Miselberg went to her room at a private residence and after waking her shot her twice with a revolver. Mary Traverse was indicted for assault in the first degree. She is alleged to have shot Pearl Ball with a revolver Dec. 16; Gust Heikkila, assault in the second degree. On Nov. 21 in the town of Culver he is alleged to have shot Charles Teeri with a revolver; Gust Evangelus, grand larceny in the second degree. He is charged with stealing a leather pouch containing \$25 from Alex Zorbas at 213 West First street, Nov. 21. Jacob Maki, alias J. Murray, grand larceny in the second degree. On Nov. 7 it is alleged he entered room 9 at the Nicollet hotel, 520 West Superior street, and stole \$40, a stick pin worth 25 cents and a necktie worth 10 cents which belonged to Fred Johnson. Alfred Nelson, grand larceny in the second degree. He is alleged to have stolen \$60 from S. D. Swanson Nov. 6.

Three separate indictments charge Emery Salyards, alias LeRoy Thomas, alias A. N. McRae, with forgery in the second degree. On Nov. 7 it is alleged that he cashed three \$85 cashier checks drawn on the Second National bank of New York at the Glass Block store, the Kelley Hardware company and the Oak Hall store. The checks were signed "Charles W. Case" but later were found to be bogus.
