### KING OF GREECE SIXTH DISTRICT SUPREME COURT STATE OFFICER W. J. BRYAN COMES OUT SQUARELY PROMISED AID AGAINST WILSON ADMINISTRATION

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5.-Former Secretary Bryan today came out squarely against President Wilson's national defense plan in an informal statement. He took issue with the president's views as expressed last night before the Manhattan club in New York city as "a departure from our traditions, a reversal of our national policy, a menace to our peace and safety and a challenge to the spirit of Christianity which teaches us to influence others by example rather than by exciting fear." This is Bryan's view of the national defense plans. Bryan's statement which reiterates the views he had previously expressed on the national prepared ness, is regarded as the opening gun in a fight which the administration leaders expect in congress against the adoption of the plan.

"I have read the president's speech at New York with sorrow and concern," said Bryan. "He is doing what he believes to be his duty and so long as a man follows his conscience and judgment we cannot criticize his motives, but we may be compelled to dissent from his conclusions. He has announced a policy never before adopted in this country, never endorsed by any party, and he has no way of knowing until he hears from the people whether he has correctly interpreted the will of the public. Thigpen and James Miller and two American chauffeurs, J. S. Pylant and A. L. Wilson had been killed Wednesday by Carranza riflemen near Agua Prieta.

They are now declared to be held prisoners by Villa at Verde, 20 miles south of Naco. The belief is general that Villa deliberately told the story.

Two Divisions of British Troops Join French at Strumnitza.

LONDON NOT OPTIMISTIC OVER GREEK SITUATION

Overthrow of Zaimis Cabinet May Not Mean Greece Will Go to Aid of Serbians.

(BY ASSOCIATED PRESS)

BERLIN, (Wireless to Say-ville), Nov. 5.—Advances all along the line by the Teutonic forces invading Serbia were announced today in the official statement. It is reported that the Bulgarians have completely defeated the French forces which had landed at Saloniki at a point northeast of Philip. They were routed and many captured. The first French prisoners have arrived at Kustindil.

PARIS, Nov. 5.—The Bulgarian artillery violently bombarded the Nish-Ava river Wednesday, says a Saloniki dispatch to the Matin filed yesterday. They captured Nish-Kavola, a small town two hours' march northeast of Nish. French headquarters, according to a Saloniki dispatch, admits that two days ago the Bulgarians in the Belijovan region, near Negotin effected a junction with Austro-German cavalry. It is asserted, however that the natural difficulties encountered in this district are so great that it is doubtful whether the union of the forces will serve any practical end. Negotin is on the Danube river at a point where only the river separates Roumanian territory from the frontiers of the Bulgarians and Serbians.
