State Agent for Humane Society

MINNEAPOLIS, Nov. 24.—To secure adequate funds with which to respond to appeals sent in from outside the city the Minnesota Humane society will send an agent to travel through Minnesota during the coming year personally answering complaints of state society and enrolling members.

"Although we have been seriously handicapped for funds to carry on our local work we have made, during the past year, personal investigation of complaints, and have been able to assign to the state campaign and she will commence immediately. We hope to pay Mrs. Hill's expenses with contributions received from friends outside of Minneapolis district."

The determination of the Minnesota society to send out state workers followed closely on receipt of a letter from President William O. Stillman, president of the American Humane society, Albany, N. Y., urging the plan.

"It is a policy," President Stillman wrote, "that will undoubtedly be of great benefit in building up your strength and helping to secure a following that will make it possible to do something of real value."
