

CANDLES LIGHTED IN HOMES OF CITY JEWS

Celebration of Hanukkah, Feast
of Dedication, Is Begun—Fes-
tival to Last Eight Days.

Last night marked the beginning of the Jewish feast of dedication, Hanukkah, which will be celebrated for eight days. In the homes of all orthodox Jews one candle was lighted with a Shumess, and for each subsequent night, one additional candle will be burned.

The holiday is in commemoration of the victory of the Jews over the Syrians more than 2,000 years ago. After the battle, the Jews, wishing to re-dedicate the temple, found one flask of oil, which they thought would burn for only a few hours. But, to their surprise, it burned for eight days. In commemoration of this wonder, the Jews celebrate this festival by burning lights in their homes.

Services will be held at the Adas Israel synagogue on Saturday, also special services on Sunday night. Services at the Temple Emanuel will be held tomorrow night. Rabbi Lefkowitz will preside, and the topic of his address will be "The Eternal Warfare."
