in the theft of \$3,000 worth of cop-per anode plates from a Northern Pa-cific freight car Nov. 5, 1913. He was at the time in the employ of the com-pany as a switchman. Zigmund Zalk, foreman of the Duluth Iron & Metal toreman of the Duluth Iron & Metal company, jointly indicted on the same charge with Robertson and Joseph state. He confessed to the actual removal of the copper plates from the car, and swore that he paid Robertson and Regall for "spotting," it near the metal company's yard to facilitate the metal company's yard to facilitate the theft.

Flavs Zalk.

In his address to the jury yesterday in his address to the jury yesterday John H. Norton, Robertson's attor-ney, exceriated Zalk, likening him to Judas Iscariot. "One of his race years ago betrayed his Savior for 30 pieces of silver." shouted the attorney. "And Zalk would now betray a man who has never done him any for 32 pieces of copper plate." harm

A strong plea for acquittal on the ground of the state's failure to prove the defendant guilty beyond a reasonable doubt without corroborsted testimony, was made by the attorney.

County Attorney Greene forcefully presented the state's case. He ridiculed the theory of the defense that Zalk was "framing" a case against

the defendant.
