

DULUTH JEWS CELEBRATE MOST SACRED DAY OF YEAR

Yom Kippur Observed With Elaborate Ceremonial in Temple Emanuel and at Adas Israel Synagogue.

Commencing with services last night in Temple Emanuel and at Adas Israel synagogue, and continuing all day today with elaborate ceremonial observances in both Hebrew places of worship, Yom Kippur, the day of atonement, the most sacred of all the days in the Jewish year will close at sundown today.

One of the impressive features of last night's service at Temple Emanuel, was the singing of the Ko Nidre, a plaintive supplicatory chant, which is said to be one of the finest pieces of sacred music. This was sung by Mrs. D. R. Flaaten, soprano; Miss Glenn Bartholomew, alto; Philip Gordon Browne, barytone, and A. R. Burquist, tenor, accompanied by Charles Helmer, cornetist, and Mrs. M. Lefkovits, organist.

Services today at Temple Emanuel will begin at 10:15 a. m., and will continue throughout the day, the impressive memorial service commenc-

ing at 3:30 this afternoon. At this service Dr. Lefkovits will preach on the "Hope of Immortality."

Wednesday is the feast of the Tabernacles, and evening services will begin at 8 o'clock. A special musical program will be given at the service.

At Adas Israel synagogue the Orthodox Jews gathered last night to perform their ritual of Yom Kippur, a choir of 14 male voices led by a cantor singing the quaint Hebrew chants throughout the service.

Rabbi I. Taplitz appealed for funds for the Jewish sufferers in the war zone.

Today's services with the elder, Orthodox Jews will begin soon after daybreak, many of them gathering at the synagogue before 6 o'clock to remain throughout the day, until one of the elders, upon whom the office is conferred as a high honor, blows the shofar, or ram's horn, as a signal that the day is done.
