HOLDUP GANG OPERATES.

A gang of holdup men has been operating in the vicinity of the ore docks of Superior harbor and from the stories told by sailors employed on the boats that are taking on cargoes there, several have been waylaid by the bandits in the last two weeks, according to Thomas Murphy of the ore boat Sir Naughton, who said yesterday that he was the latest victim.

According to his story, Murphy was returning to his vessel after dark when he was stopped by three men, who demanded his money—allowing him the alternative of forfeiting his life in the event of his failure to accede to the demand. As he had less than a dollar on his person he hastily capitulated.
