

DULUTH JEWS ARE OBSERVING SACRED FAST, YOM KIPPUR

Duluth Jews began the observance of Yom Kippur, the Day of Atonement, at sundown last night, with services at the Adas Israel synagogue, Temple Emanuel, and other places of worship throughout the city.

Services at Adas Israel were conducted by I. Braveman, cantor, who was assisted by a male choir. At the Temple Emanuel, Dr. Maurice Lefkowitz conducted services, preaching on "The Law of Conscience." Today he will talk on "Pure Before God," at the morning services.

The holiday is observed among adult Jews abstaining totally from any form of food. It is, moreover, the most sacred holiday on the Jewish calendar, the day being passed in prayer. The ritual of the day expresses sympathy, openness and a desire to attain a moral will.
