The last of a series of organ recitals will be given by Mrs. W. S. Wingate in Hammond Avenue Presbyterian church Wednesday night. Mrs. Wingate will be assisted by Mrs. E. S. Buckman. Mrs. Buckman is well known in Superior as a contralto soloist.

No admission will be charged to the concert but a silver collection will be taken up and this will go into the organ fund of the church to pay for the large pipe organ which has recently been installed in the church at a cost of several thousand dollars. The organ is one of the finest in the northwest. Following is the program:
