

EGAN TALKS ON WHITEWASHING NEXT TUESDAY

Hackensack, Feb. 16.—Chairman William H. Himmer of the Bergen County Legislative Committee which is to release next Tuesday the whitewashing report published in last Friday's Jersey Journal, visited Jersey City yesterday long enough to announce that he would have bills drawn up providing for the carrying out of the mild recommendations made in the committee report.

One of these recommendations is that prosecutors be prohibited by law from acting as counsel to a public body like a Court House Commission.

Just when ex-Assemblyman Himmer will have this bill or bills ready he could not say. The Legislature is to adjourn sine die March 22, and the Bergen County machine politicians are assembling and hinting that the Himmer bill would have much show.

Assemblyman Charles M. Egan, the Jersey City member of the Bergen County committee, has been disturbed by the talk of the Legislature by the fact that he signed the report whitewashing Bergen County officials who have been under fire in connection with the recent County Court House investigation.

Mr. Egan said to-day: "I have examined the report as it will be released next week and I am not sure that it is not a whitewash. It is exonerating Prosecutor Wright and County Engineer Ralph D. Earle. So I'm sure by the report signed it with the rest of the members."

"Do you recall who suggested that change giving Wright and Earle a clean bill of health?"

"I can't say," said a particular person suggested the change," said Egan.

"Do you know why Court House Commissioners Brewster and Christa and all the rest of the officials were not included in the clause?"

"I can't just say," replied Assemblyman Egan. "Anybody I don't care to say much about the report is handed in to the Legislature next week."

"Will you tell the public all about it then?"

"I think I'll have something to say," was the reply.
